

I never had the privilege of meeting Father Pelton in person, but I knew of his work, both academic and personal, prior to gauging his interest in contributing a chapter to an anthology on the topic of religion and society in Latin America. I was thrilled when he agreed, and sent him a list of themes for him to consider, such as subsidiarity, the role of CEBs, and the Church's views on social issues in contemporary Latin America. I responded, "thankfully, old enough and experienced enough to know what he's talking about."
